Reshaping Our Vision

Shortly before the pandemic struck and before Black Lives Matter demonstrations were held in Lewiston-Auburn and around the country, LA Arts began a process of reassessing how we serve our community. Our strategic thinking discussions, which began in February and continued throughout the year, resulted in a new vision statement and statement of values.

Vision Statement

LA Arts provides opportunities for artistic experience and creativity to the whole Lewiston-Auburn community, and especially to those with the least access to the arts. LA Arts supports community members and organizations working in the visual and performing arts. Through the arts, LA Arts encourages community building in our cities.

Statement of Values

We exist in community, work for community, and are responsible to our community.

- We affirm our love and respect for the community of Lewiston Auburn.
- We commit ourselves to intentional listening and community responsiveness.
- We acknowledge that the arts can be a vehicle for gentrification, and commit to examining our work through an anti-classist, anti-gentrification lens.
- We celebrate the arts as a means of building community and expressing community identity. Diversity, equity, inclusion, and anti-racism.
- We acknowledge the historical whiteness of LA Arts as an institution.
- We recognize that we do not currently reflect the diversity of our community.
- We commit ourselves to actively diversifying our board and staff.
- We commit ourselves to creating an organizational culture that rejects white supremacy and creates a space of equity and inclusion.

The arts are transformative, and the arts are for everyone to experience and create.

- We uphold the arts as a vehicle for social change, a conduit to joy, and a means of self-expression.
- We believe the arts are a springboard for learning, dialogue, and personal development.
- We celebrate everyone's artistic nature and commit to creating opportunities for all in our community to create, learn, and experience the arts.

We define the arts, art-making, and artists expansively.

- We celebrate the arts as a means of building community and expressing community identity.
- We celebrate all who engage in creative self-expression as artists.
- We dedicate ourselves to supporting artists of all kinds in our community.
- We commit to challenging our own biases about what constitutes art.

Facing New Challenges

No sooner had we articulated this vision for our organization than the first of two misfortunes struck. The COVID-19 pandemic shut down our three primary program vehicles: Art Walk Lewiston Auburn, the LA Arts Gallery on Lisbon Street, and the LA Arts Downstage performance space. Then, mold remediation in the Downstage last summer left the space unusable, so LA Arts must now find new space for performances.

Art Walk LA Goes Virtual

While Covid-19 prevented us from safely gathering for in-person art walks in 2020, LA Arts kept the spirit of the event alive with virtual art walks on the final Friday of May through October. Links to these monthly online events, including music, digital art, spoken word, dance and other videos can be found on the <u>LA Arts website</u>, our <u>YouTube channel</u>, and our <u>Facebook</u> and <u>Instagram</u> feeds.

The <u>LA Arts website</u> also includes a display page of works by all visual artists who registered for 2020 Art Walk LA, along with artists' contact information. Registration for this page is free, and 100 percent of proceeds from any sales directly benefit the artists. In addition to promoting these Maine-based artists, LA Arts was pleased to offer modest stipends to artists, performers, and speakers in featured Art Walk LA videos.

At a time when access to the arts has never been more important to the wellbeing of our community, we've been encouraged by the response to these virtual events and their popular monthly features such as time lapse art renderings, Local Writers Read 'Genre Spotlights,' and Bates College student performances. The event drew an average of more than 1,800 viewers each month. We hope Art Walk LA will be back in-person in time for its 10th anniversary season on May 28, 2021. In the meantime, after a brief holiday break, we plan to continue with *virtual* Art Walk LA on the final Friday of January through April, 2021.

New Public Art Underway

Through the pandemic, we and our partner, the LA Metro Chamber of Commerce, have continued working on the public art program that we had begun under a \$75,000 Maine Arts Commission Creative Communities = Economic Development Phase 2 Grant for implementation of Cultural Plan LA. This work has culminated in the commissioning of a major art work for each of the cities: an abstract granite sculpture by Hugh Lassen for the entrance to Great Falls Plaza in Auburn and an array of realistic sculpted foxes by Andy Rosen for a site in the canal district of Lewiston.

As we prepare for the unveiling of these works in spring 2021, we are planning further public art projects that will give us an ever more beautiful and provocative cityscape.

Connecting to our Communities

As the pandemic wears on, the rising concern about racial justice in this country has encouraged us at LA Arts to think through the lenses of racial and economic disparities, about the very issues of access to the arts and support for artists that we raised in our strategy meetings in February. Our board discussions have turned to the questions of how we can better engage with groups in our cities that we have served less well, particularly immigrant communities, the disadvantaged, the disabled, and the elderly. Our first action emerging from this discussion is a decision to hire a part-time community organizer from the local immigrant communities to help us connect better with individuals and organizations in those communities. Once public health conditions permit, this employee will help bring us together with people in these communities to plan a public art work celebrating the contribution of African immigrants to the culture of our cities.

New Space for Expanded Programs

It is impossible, of course, to say exactly when and how we will be able to restart our in-person programming: public performances, exhibitions, in-person art walks, public art projects, and more. But we are planning all of those programs with new attention to serving the needs and interests of those who have previously had limited access to the arts. That means, among other things, that we are looking to replace our lost Downstage space with new space not just for performances, but also for workshops, lessons, and arts-making of all kinds, spaces that will support and bring together the working artists of our community and those who want to learn.

To bring this ambitious goal to life in these hard times, we rely on members of this community to entrust us with their generous gifts, which we appreciate deeply.
